Paradox of our Time

The paradox of our time in history is that we have taller buildings, but shorter tempers; wider freeways, but narrower viewpoints. We spend more, but have less. We have bigger houses and smaller families.

We have multiplied our possessions, but reduced our values. We've learned how to make a living, but not a life; we've added years to life, not life to years. We've done larger things, but not better things. We've cleaned up the air, but polluted the soul.

We plan more but accomplish less. We build more computers to hold more information to produce more copies than ever, but have less communication.

These are the times of fast food and slow digestion; tall men and short character; steep profits, and shallow relationships.

These are the days of two incomes, but more divorce; fancier houses, but broken homes. These are the days of pills to do everything from cheer to quiet, to kill.

Matthew 16 begins with the Pharisees approaching Jesus and asking for a sign. This was done in order to tempt Him (1). Jesus said they could tell the weather by the color of the sky but were unable to discern **the signs of the times** (3). The point was that there were already sufficient signs given to recognize that Jesus was the Christ. They did not need more signs. They needed to discern the meaning of the signs already given. He let them know the resurrection of His crucified body would be the ultimate sign for all to see that He was the Christ (4).

After this the Apostles became concerned because they had forgotten bread. When Jesus warned them about *the leaven of the Pharisees* they believed He was talking about the missing bread (5-12). The Apostles failed to make the appropriate application to their situation. They had missed the sign. If Jesus could feed thousands He could certainly provide for them. Like the Pharisees, the Apostles were struggling to read **the signs of the time** which identified the almighty Messiah.

This phrase (**the signs of the time**) reminded me of the above article by Mr. Carlin. There are things all around us to help us see where we are headed, and yet we move through life blindly. Our innovations have outrun our morals. Just because we know <u>how</u> to do something does not mean we <u>ought</u> to do it. We can clone, euthanize painlessly, abort babies, and a dozen other things. The capability of the scientific developments are staggering. However, the moral judgment is lagging way behind. Because we have a pill that will kill, should it ever be taken? Because we can, does not mean we should.

The smart phone was developed after the article was written, but Mr. Carlin was on the same track when he mentioned the increased capabilities of computers. We have increased our access to information, but we have decreased our ability to communicate at the same time.

We can find out facts in a fraction of the time we used to. We do not need to get out an encyclopedia or go to the library resource room. We simply ask our phone or some other device for the answer, and we have it immediately.

We are so amazed by our access to <u>facts</u> that we have not noticed our loss of <u>feelings</u>. We now communicate just to <u>learn</u> and have ceased to <u>share</u> and <u>grow</u> with one another. Today lovers cannot look into one another's eyes and share their hearts without the interruption of a cell phone. It used to be we could walk in the woods or drive in the country to escape the house phone, but now the constant interrupter is always in our pocket. It goes where we go. It makes us feel important, informed, and in sync with what is going on. But at what cost? Will we lose all our <u>meaningful relationships</u> in order to gain instant <u>surface knowledge</u>?

We need to read **the signs of our time**. We are losing our values because we find no time to pray or meditate on the Bible. We are too busy for worship. We are increasing in knowledge, wealth, and physical fitness, but deteriorating in spirit. God is mentioned more in profanity than He is in prayer. He has become an emergency contact instead of a constant companion to many Christians. Most Americans have released God in order to embrace science. Are we being blind to the **signs** of our own destruction?
